


- ◆ Watts at the Door

# Soccer Tournament

This January CBS Charleville held a 1<sup>st</sup> and 2<sup>nd</sup> Year Soccer Tournament in aid of Cliona's Foundation. The event was played in an excellent spirit throughout, with strong participation, teamwork and sportsmanship. Well done to everyone who contributed to the organisation of the event and the support of such a worthwhile cause!





It has been a remarkable year for CBC Debating, with students achieving outstanding success at regional, national and international level. The season began strongly on 18 October when Charlie Coakley and Sean Ahern were crowned champions of the UCD Literary and Historical Society National Mace, hosted by the UCD Literary and Historical Society. Their success in this respected senior competition was a significant early achievement.

Liam Canty and Mathew Hiras also achieved notable success across several competitions. On 15 October they secured first place at the Cork October League before going on to win the St. Aloysius College, Carrigtwohill Mace on 15 November. Their consistency continued into the New Year when they claimed the Coláiste Spioraid Naoimh Mace on 17 January, underlining their status as one of the leading teams on the circuit. Individual honours were also earned, with Killian McCarthy awarded Best Individual Speaker at the St. Aloysius College, Carrigtwohill Mace in recognition of his composure and analytical skill.

January proved particularly successful. On 20 January, four CBC teams competed in the Irish qualifiers for the Oxford Schools Debating Championships at the Institute of Education in Dublin. Séany McSweeney and Guan Hui Lin qualified in first place and will represent CBC at the Championships on 14 March at the University of Oxford. On 24 January, three CBC junior teams competed in the Munster Regional Competition, which consisted of three preliminary rounds and a final. Every CBC participant qualified for the National Final at University College Dublin in April, a notable achievement in itself. Rory McDonnell and Sam O'Farrell were crowned Munster Regional Champions, with Rory finishing Top of the Tab overall and receiving the Best First Year Debater Award.

The following day, 25 January, four CBC teams returned to the Institute of Education for the Cambridge Trials. Once again, Séany McSweeney and Guan Hui Lin qualified in first place and will represent CBC at the Cambridge Schools Debating Championships at the University of Cambridge. The breadth and consistency of these achievements reflect the dedication, preparation and ambition of CBC's debaters. From junior regional titles to qualification for Oxford and Cambridge, this has been a year of which the entire school community can be justly proud.

## Update on the CBC Zambia Immersion Project

February 2026 marks the midpoint of our preparations and fundraising for the 2025-26 Zambia Immersion Project at CBC. These last five months have been extremely productive. Travelling students have been engaged in fundraising activities, attending preparatory workshops, and raising awareness of the situation and needs of the people in Mazabuka, Zambia.

Fundraising events thus far have been varied, but have reflected the diverse interests and skills of the travelling fourteen students. From Jazz concerts, dance classes, cookery demos, and coffee mornings to table quizzes and online raffles, students have engaged with their local communities and social circles in their fundraising attempts.

Within CBC the students have engaged in raising funds and awareness also; visiting classes, organising a darts tournament, bake sales, and arranging several competitions amongst students.

Travelling more than 8,000 km from Ireland to Zambia, to a culture very different from our own is likely to be challenging for Fifth Year students, particularly given the stark inequalities in wealth in Zambia, and the HIV/AIDS epidemic that currently affects roughly one million people there. Accordingly, in preparation for the trip, the fourteen travelling students have participated in three Global Citizenship Education (GCE) workshops. The workshops, organised by SERVE, have several purposes ranging from learning about Zambian culture and life to journaling strategies as a means of processing experiences while in Zambia. Helping students understand the need to share their life stories, values, and experiences with the people in Mazabuka is an important part of CBC's Zambia Immersion Project. This idea has permeated the workshops so far. In a similar vein, the GCE workshops have relayed the importance of bringing these stories back to Ireland and sharing them with the wider CBC community.

There are several more things in the pipeline for the fourteen travelling students over the coming months. Students will learn basic sign language in preparation for their visit to a special needs school in Mazabuka, students are collecting jerseys and sports gear to bring with them and give to students in the schools there. We will also get our trip itinerary from SERVE, which will provide us with details of the projects and activities we will engage with while over in Zambia. Additionally our main fundraising event, The Chaser, will take place at Vienna Woods in Cork on the 16th April.

In closing, when we selected the students that will travel to Zambia in June 2026, we felt that we had selected fourteen highly impressive young candidates. Based on their maturity, their willingness to engage thoroughly with all activities related to the Immersion Project, and the leadership skills they are demonstrating, each of us teachers feel vindicated in our choices.

## Background of CBC's Zambia Immersion Project

CBC's Zambia Immersion Project is a nine-month long project consisting of fundraising followed by a two week trip to Mazabuka in Zambia. Under the auspices of SERVE, an Irish development and volunteering organisation based in Cork, fourteen students and three teachers are set to travel this June.

This current trip marks the third time that CBC students and teachers have made the journey under the SERVE umbrella. Whilst in Zambia students will work on improving facilities in and around local schools. They will work on banana plantations, teach in one of the local schools, and meet local students. In previous years students have also taken it upon themselves to organise several soccer matches and Sports Days with students in Mazabuka. We expect that CBC will have a similar positive impact during the upcoming trip in June 2026.



## Catholic Schools Week 2026

Catholic Schools Week was celebrated in CBC from 18<sup>th</sup> to the 24<sup>th</sup> January. The theme for this year was 'Catholic Schools: Normal Lives, Called to Holiness'. A reflection was delivered to the student body each morning by the College Chaplain, Mr. Simon Kelliher. These 'Thoughts for the Day' encouraged pupils to ponder their lives, and encouraged them to make CBC a more spiritual, welcoming and loving Catholic community.

Prayer services were held in the School Oratory during the week by the Religion Department.

A Fifth Year Mass was celebrated by Fr. John O Donovan in St. Patrick's Church and attended by one hundred and fifty pupils and their teachers in honour of Catholic Schools Week.



## Gaelbhratach

This year saw the launch of the Gaelbhratach scheme in CBC. This is a national Irish-language programme that encourages schools to increase their daily use of Gaeilge in fun and meaningful ways. Coordinated by Gael Linn, the scheme supports students and teachers in creating an Irish-speaking atmosphere through a wide range of events. Schools work towards earning the Gaelbhratach flag, which recognises their commitment to promoting spoken Irish beyond the classroom. The initiative empowers young people to take ownership of their language, fostering pride, confidence, and a positive Irish-language culture within the school community. Since its launch in September, students from 1<sup>st</sup> to 6<sup>th</sup> year have been taking part in events which promote Gaeilge in our school. Events include Tae agus Plé, Seanfhocail agus Seacláid, Scannánaíocht naGaeilge, comórtais Charta naNollag and many more. We have a fantastic Coistena Gaeilge comprised of 22 students who engage with students and staff to implement this initiative. They also created our beautiful motto of Cairdeas Bród Cultúr which is displayed around the school. We are looking forward to many more enjoyable events in 2026. Beir bua agus Beannacht!

Both Charlie and Chris featured in Ireland's impressive 30-27 victory over Italy in the Six Nations Championship.


We wish them continued success with the Irish U20 squad.

They have big plans this term which includes their Greenhouse project where students are hoping that this project would eliminate the need for Tidy Towns to buy plants in supervalu.

The group are also in the process of installing a rainwater gutter at Tidy Towns main shed, which will work as a rainwater collection system running directly into Tidy Towns tank which will be a sustainable water collection daily for the Tidy Town team.

The group will also be meeting with a Tree Specialist for a tour at the end of this month and plan to use this knowledge to help Tidy Towns in the completion of Tramore Nature Trail.





## Inspiring Transformational Leadership

### A School Community's Voice in Shaping the Future of Education

The Irish Convention on Education represents a once-in-a-generation opportunity to shape the future of Ireland's education system. It invites children and young people, parents, educators, and the wider community to reflect on what education should look like — not just for today, but for decades to come.

As a school community, we believe it is vital that those who experience education every day have a strong and meaningful voice in this national conversation. For this reason, our school was proud to submit a collective response to the Convention, informed by the experiences, hopes, and insights of our students.

Our submission was shaped through consultation and discussion across a group of 60 randomly selected students in 5th and 6th year. The session was facilitated by our 6th year Prefects. Pupils were encouraged to share their views on what helps them learn best, what challenges they face, and what school should prepare them for in the future. This collaborative approach ensured that our submission reflects the voice of our students. It was a wonderful opportunity to inspire transformational leadership among our students.

The Convention on Education offers Ireland a rare chance to take a long-term, joined-up approach to education reform. Our school's submission reflects a belief that education should be inclusive, forward-looking, and rooted in the real experiences of those who learn in schools every day.

We are proud to have contributed to this important national conversation and hope that the voices of our community — especially our young people — will help shape an education system that is fairer, more responsive and fit for the future.


## Leinster Swimming Champions




### **Artist of the Month : Anne Madden**

### **Oatlands School Art Competition**





They even made national headlines as a result. Making the trip one they surely won't forget in a hurry.




### **Student Council Elections: Student Voice in Action**

Our 3rd Year students had a lovely outing to the Dean Crowe Theatre, Athlone to watch the stage production of 'The Merchant of Venice'.






### Biology Revision in UL


We hope Troy can deliver again in March as we face Czechia in the semi-final and hopefully Denmark or North Macedonia in the play-off final and bring us to a World Cup.

### **Virtual Reality**

#### **OCS Invests in Virtual Reality to Transform Classroom Learning**

OCS is taking an exciting step forward in digital education with the development of a new Virtual Reality (VR) Headset Lab, made possible through recently secured STEM funding through local charity partner The Liffey Trust. Thanks in particular to Fergal Madden of the Liffey Trust for liaising with ex-HSCL Tom Farrelly in getting the funding across the line.



Work on the state-of-the-art VR lab will begin shortly after Easter, following the completion of the school's second ASD unit. This innovative space will provide students with immersive, hands-on learning experiences designed to deepen understanding and engagement across a range of subjects.

The primary focus of the VR lab is to enhance STEM education. Through interactive simulations and virtual environments, students will gain a clearer understanding of complex scientific concepts, engineering principles, mathematical applications and technological processes. By bringing abstract ideas to life, VR technology will allow students to experience learning in a dynamic and practical way.

However, the impact of the VR lab will extend well beyond STEM subjects. In Geography, students will embark on virtual field trips to explore landscapes, ecosystems and global environments from the classroom. History lessons will be transformed as students "travel back in time" to experience key historical events and settings. Modern Foreign Language classes will benefit from immersive cultural experiences, enabling students to explore countries where the target language is spoken without leaving the school building.

The technology will also support Career Guidance, allowing students to sample different career pathways through virtual simulations. This will help them make more informed decisions about subject choices as they prepare for Senior Cycle. This initiative reflects OCS's continued commitment to innovation, inclusion and preparing students for the rapidly evolving digital world. The introduction of the VR lab marks another significant milestone in the school's mission to provide engaging, forward-thinking educational opportunities for all students.

## **Cycling programme** **Excelling in teaching and learning**






### New School Crest: Competition Winner Announced!

The Crest Committee consisted of students, staff, parents and board members while the judging panel also reflected the breadth of our school community and included a representative from our patron body ERST Leo Hogan, the Chairperson of the Board of Management Billy O'Shea, the Chairperson of the Parents' Association, Carel Van Der Merwe, a student representative Jack, a member of staff Teresa Muarry and two community members Fr Odhran and Monsignor Joe. This wide representation ensured a fair, balanced and thoughtful selection process.

## What Happens Next?

We are now entering the professional redesign phase. The chosen crest will be refined in collaboration with graphic designers to ensure it is suitable for use across all platforms and materials.

Once finalised, the new crest will gradually be introduced over a six-year phased transition. During this time, it will replace the existing crest on school uniforms, headed paper and official documentation, school policies, signage and publications and digital platforms.

This careful, phased approach allows for a smooth and practical transition for families while marking an exciting new chapter in our school's history.

A school crest is more than a logo — it represents who we are, what we stand for and the legacy we carry forward. We are incredibly proud of the creativity and engagement shown by our students throughout this process.

We would like to sincerely thank all of the students who participated and contributed their creativity and ideas throughout the process. Our appreciation also extends to Ms Claire Wilson for facilitating the student voice workshops and presentations, Ms Edel Whelan for leading the Crest Committee, Ms Teresa Murray for coordinating the exhibition in the Art Room and Ms Mary O'Hanlon for digitising all entries.

The final decision was made on Friday, January 30th by a representative and balanced judging panel comprising Billy O'Shea (Chairperson, Board of Management), Leo Hogan (ERST Representative), Carel Van Der Merwe (Chairperson, Parents' Association), Jack (Student Council Representative), Teresa Murray (Art Teacher), Fr Odhran Furlong and Monsignor Joe McGrath.

We also acknowledge with gratitude the contribution of Fr Odhran Furlong to the judging process. This was his final official task in CBS. May he rest in peace.




### Dazzling Designs

Excitement is building at CBS High School Clonmel as our STEM Club continues to reach new heights! Since kicking off the new school year on September 3rd, the club has become a hub of innovation, creativity, and problem-solving. With the highly anticipated STEM Fair coming up on March 12th, the energy during our weekly sessions is electric.

Meeting every Wednesday at lunchtime, the club has seen a fantastic turnout this year. We started the term with hands-on mechanical construction sessions, where students dived into the fundamentals of engineering. One of the major highlights of the first term was Maths Week, which was largely driven by the STEM Club's enthusiasm. The school was buzzing with daily "Countdown" challenges that tested the speed and logic of students across all year groups.

The STEM Club also hosted a dedicated stand in the school reception, packed with puzzles and brain-teasers that kept everyone on their toes. It was wonderful to see so many students engaging with the activities, and even better to see so many walk away as winners! A special mention must go to Brian Roche (1st Year), who gave an inspiring talk and tutorial on Scratch ([scratch.mit.edu](http://scratch.mit.edu)) during the week. Brian did a fantastic job teaching his peers about the world of coding, and the session was a hit with everyone who attended. The club's reach didn't stop there; they also organized and ran a challenging TY Maths Quiz, ensuring that the Transition Year students were kept sharp and competitive!

Before the Christmas break, our members turned their engineering talents toward a festive cause. Over several weeks, the club worked diligently to build a magnificent Lego Christmas Tree. This wasn't just for display in our halls—it was a special gift for the Clonmel Hospital, bringing a bit of STEM-inspired cheer to patients and staff over the holidays.





Our students haven't just been building with Lego; they've been dominating on the national stage. We are incredibly proud of Asmeer Mohammed, who achieved a perfect score in the 2025 Maggie Gough Maths Competition. Asmeer was one of only 90 students out of 23,200 participants across 232 schools nationwide to achieve full marks. In January, Brian Roche and Cillian Conran achieved the highest scores in the school's IMTA Maths Competition among the first-year cohort.






## An Dáil & European Parliament

Well done Sean from us all in The Highschool Clonmel!






A great achievement and a day to remember for St. Mary's CBS, we are so proud of you all.


The team went on to defeat Malahide CS in the Leinster B Football final and now face the winners of Scoil Dara Kilcock and St. Joseph's Drogheda.



- Promoting Partnership. Working closely with St. Cronan's Parish, Brackenstown, Swords.


### Entrance Scholarship Awards (Excellence in Teaching and Learning )
