

The new €25 million school building will provide state-of-the-art classrooms, specialist teaching spaces, social spaces, science labs, a new sports hall and a special education needs unit.

Dublin Diocesan Pilgrimage to Lourdes

In September, Charlie Duffy, Dónal Boyd, Joshua Ralph, Seamus Mabingnay and Alex Cheevers joined Mr. Foster and flew to Lourdes, in France, to join in the Dublin Diocesan Pilgrimage to Lourdes. During the pilgrimage our experience was represented by the pilgrimage candle which was lit at the front of the school.







The work started immediately, helping pilgrims to the plane and looking after them.

Our students were working from 7:30am to 11pm every night, assisting pilgrims, and taking part in liturgy duties. The students thoroughly enjoyed the experience, performing karaoke to entertain the pilgrims long into the night, running table quizzes, performing water duty at the masses.

During the opening mass, celebrated by the Archbishop of Dublin, Dermot Farrell, Alex Cheevers provides water to pilgrims.

Friendships for life were made between our school and the team from St. Paul's Raheny.

One of the highlights of the pilgrimage was the candlelit procession. Over 2,500 people walked behind the statute of the Blessed Virgin Mary. Coláiste Choilm was one of two schools chosen to lead the procession, with our 5 students walking beside the statute as the crowds walked behind. They then joined his grace, the Archbishop Dermot Farrell and Bishop Paul Dempsey on the steps of the Basilica as we all watched on.

The main duty of a Brancardier (Male Volunteer) is to assist the pilgrims in getting to the different ceremonies.



There is a tradition in Lourdes of lighting a candle as a sign of hope. The Coláiste Choilm candle was carried through the streets of Lourdes by Seamus and lit by all 5 students and placed in the Chapel of Light.

HIGH SCHOOL CLONMEL

125 Years of Education in Clonmel

2024/2025 is a significant milestone for the CBS High School in Clonmel as it celebrates 125 years since its establishment in 1899. This followed significant work by the Christian Brothers of Clonmel, a group of leading citizens, the Parish Priest of SS Peters and Paul's and the Bishop of Waterford and Lismore who initiated the project of providing a Catholic High School for the town and district of Clonmel to provide education 'for every class in the community'. The original building still stands tall and is used on a daily basis by the High School today.

Over the years, the school has played a crucial role in the educational development of young people in Clonmel and its surrounding areas. It has built a strong reputation for academic excellence, extracurricular achievements and a commitment to fostering a supportive and inclusive community. It has undergone significant evolution in this period, adapting to changes in education, society and technology whilst remaining committed to its inclusive ethos as a Catholic school founded in the Edmund Rice tradition.

In the early years it saw a growing demand for education, leading to an increase in student enrollment and the need for expansion in facilities and staff. It also saw the need for extracurricular activities, including sports, music, chess, debating and Model UN which served as an integral addition to student life. It has embraced technological changes, incorporating computers and digital tools into the classroom. Significant investments were made in upgrading the school's infrastructure, including the construction of new classrooms, science labs and an all-weather pitch. The new extension, which will start soon, costing 8.5 million indicates further the continuous upgrading of its facilities.

Education for all.


Since 2010 the school has made significant strides in embracing neurodiversity in its approach to education. One area where this is visible is in the support of students with ASD into mainstream classrooms. As the understanding of neurodiversity deepens, so too does the commitment of a highly qualified staff to provide these students with the tools and resources they need to thrive alongside their peers. 'The Hub' is an area which offers a safe haven, a structured environment and specialised teaching strategies.


Adapting to national educational reforms, the school updated its curriculum to align with the new Junior and Leaving Certificate programs, focusing on student-centered learning and assessment. In recent years, subjects such as Agricultural Science, Politics and Society and Computer Science have been added to the already extensive subject choice list for Senior Cycle. The school has also made huge strides in promoting inclusivity and diversity, ensuring that students from all backgrounds feel welcome. There has been a greater emphasis on mental health and wellbeing, with support systems put in place for students. It continues to strengthen its ties with the local community, engaging in various programs, partnerships with local businesses and environmental initiatives, reflecting a broader commitment to social responsibility.

Since its foundation, the school continues to be an all boys secondary school using teaching methods specifically tailored to how boys generally learn best. There is a strong sense of camaraderie and brotherhood among students as they engage in healthy competition with one another, supporting each other to excel academically and in extracurricular activities. There are also links forged with both the Presentation and the Loreto Secondary Schools, where High School students participate in both extra curricular and social justice based activities throughout the year.

The school has aimed in the past, and will continue to aim going forward, to develop well-rounded students whilst continuing to place a strong emphasis on academic success. This is reflected in the impressive performance of students in state exams, particularly the Junior and Leaving Certificates, which are critical for university admission, apprenticeships and future career prospects. This year three students obtained maximum points of 625 and the results were almost double the national average in terms of students achieving over 600 points. A further quarter obtained more than 500 points and a further 50% higher than 400 points. According to the Principal Karen Steenson, the phrase "one shoe does not fit everyone" resonates deeply in the school, especially when it comes to academic success. Just as a single shoe cannot accommodate every foot, a single approach to learning and achievement cannot meet the diverse needs of all students. Recognising this, the High School uses a variety of strategies to ensure every student thrives and reaches his potential. The school continues to be proud and celebrates the achievements of all their students.

Celebrations of our 125th Anniversarry

Celebrations got off to a great start with past pupil Daire Lynch and a graduate from Yale University, winning a bronze medal in Rowing at the Olympics. Also a bursary of €250,000 has been set up for Leaving Certificate students who wish to pursue a career in Medicine. This is due to the generosity of former student Terry O'Callaghan, who himself received a medical scholarship after his Leaving Certificate in the High School. Terry, a son of Dr. Pat O'Callaghan, also a former Olympian, wanted to give something back to his alma mater and this incredible bursary will no doubt hugely benefit future students in the school. Every year the school welcomes the return of many past pupils who continue to share their wisdom and experience with the current generation of High School students.

The school community came together in September with a Mass of Thanksgiving celebrated by the Most Rev Bishop Alphonsus Cullinan DD in SS Peter and Paul's Church. Workshops organised by former students working as translators in Brussels will also take place before Christmas. An exhibition starting on the 21st November will be set up in the County Museum exhibiting photographs and memorabilia from the school's 125 years. A Mayoral Reception will also be held in recognition of the contribution the school has made to education. In January, a televised Mass featuring our chaplain Fr Michael Toomey and students from the High School will be broadcast from RTÉ to celebrate Catholic Schools' Week.

In March, a STEM fair will be held highlighting past, present and future STEM brilliance in the school. Winners of the fair will have the opportunity to enter their projects into SCIFEST and the BT Young Scientist.

The celebrations will culminate with a Gala Dinner in May 2025 with music by the Pearly Whites - a band initially set up by these brilliant musicians while they were students in the High School.

Teacher Volunteer: Miss Lucy Galvin's Summer 2024 Visit to Uganda

First Class Teacher Miss Lucy Galvin visited Uganda this past Summer as one of eight volunteers at a hospice for deaf children. Their work involved renovations to a classroom and the founding of the GAA'S newest club- 'Nile Óg Cusacks'. Below is a letter from Lucy to our school community following fundraising efforts and generous donations during Sports Day last June. We as a school community would like to commend her on her wonderful work.



Dear School Community,

As many of you know I went to Uganda during the summer with a group of 8 other local volunteers, to work and support a local school and hospice in Jinja, Uganda. I just wanted to write a short message to say thank you and to let you know where the raised funds went.

Overall, our school raised 2,100 euro! In total it cost 960 euro to refurbish and decorate a classroom in Walukuba West Primary School in Jinja which catered for 30 children who are differently abled and all of which are deaf. All of the football boots that were collected also went to this school which helped in the start up of a GAA club. The "Nile Óg Cusacks" club is now set up and coaches are training there two days a week for the entirety of the school year.

The remaining 450 euro went with the money collected by the other volunteers and helps to fund the Rays of Hope Hospice in Jinja. In total the hospice was given 54,855 euro. This hospice was founded in 2005 by Dr. Frank and Patricia Hassett from Clare. It is the only palliative care service in the Busoga region of Uganda which homes over 3.5 million people. Through this funding, patients receive free medication and pain relief while also providing psycho-social support and looking after the children of bereaved families, by paying for their school fees.

Thank you again for all of the support as it has truly benefitted so many children and patients in Uganda.

Immersion Programme

The ERST (Edmund Rice Schools Trust) immersion programme to South Africa during Summer 2024 was an unforgettable journey that profoundly influenced all of us who participated. We began our two-week adventure in Pretoria, where we were warmly welcomed by the Mount Saint Edmund School community. During our week there, we had the privilege of teaching classes, working directly with students, and exchanging innovative ideas with our South African colleagues. This collaboration fostered a deep sense of connection and shared purpose, as we discovered both similarities and differences in our educational approaches. The experience enriched our understanding of teaching and learning in a different cultural context, providing valuable insights that we could bring back to our own schools.

While in Pretoria, we also had the opportunity to explore the local area, with visits to a nearby cheetah park and the Apartheid Museum in Johannesburg. These excursions were not just leisure activities; they were integral to our understanding of South Africa's complex history and diverse culture. The Apartheid Museum, in particular, offered a sobering yet essential perspective on the country's painful past and its ongoing efforts towards healing and reconciliation.

The second week took us to Maristal School, a rural institution set up by the Christian Brothers. The school's isolated location and lack of basic amenities like hot water or sports facilities highlighted the challenges faced by the students and staff. Yet, from the moment we arrived, greeted by 500 boarders aged 5 to 17 with dancing, bonfires, and music, we were struck by the community's warmth and resilience. Our time there was spent teaching classes, serving meals, and working on a special project: painting and decorating two playrooms for the young boys and girls. The students' eagerness to learn and their families' commitment to education, despite the harsh conditions, were deeply inspiring and humbling.

It is essential to acknowledge the importance of immersion programs, as they facilitate a common commitment among educators worldwide to promote Edmund Rice education and find innovative ways to advance our shared ethos. Through immersion experiences, we enrich our Edmund Rice Network by engaging with like-minded educators from across the globe.



Embracing these heart connections not only deepens the charism of Edmund Rice in the lives of teachers but also strengthens our collective ability to make a meaningful impact.

In the final days of our immersion, we travelled to Cape Town, where we partnered with Justice Desk Africa, an organization dedicated to empowering young people from the townships. We stayed and worked with them, contributing to programs that focused on leadership and self-empowerment for young girls and boys. The philosophy of Justice Desk Africa—to nurture the potential of young people and encourage them to be agents of change—resonated deeply with our own values. This final experience brought our journey full circle, as we witnessed first-hand the transformative power of education and community engagement.

To conclude, it is hoped that in the near future, we will organize a student immersion to South Africa or Zambia, allowing our students to experience first-hand the transformative power of such programs.



Brother Ambrose Treacy (1834-1912), Past Pupil – Founder of Christian Brother schools in Australia and New Zealand Patrick Ambrose Treacy was born 31 August 1834 in Thurles, Co. Tipperary. On Friday 13 February 1852 he left home for the Novitiate in Waterford.

He taught in Waterford for three years before going to Wexford where he spent eight years, becoming an accomplished teacher. He took charge of the Brothers' school in Carlow in 1863, showing good leadership qualities.

In July 1868 the Superior General appointed him as leader of the Australian mission to Melbourne. He and three other Brothers left Ireland on 15 August 1868 and arrived in Melbourne on 18 November 1868.






Edmund Rice Education Beyond Borders


Our students worked in the hospital and supported our VIP pilgrims, many of whom had mobility restrictions and required assistance to attend the many religious services.

Maggie Gough Competition as part of Maths Week

Maths week in Oatlands College had numerous activities including daily quizzes, attendance at Maths lectures in UCD, maths walking tours of Dublin city centre and maths themed biscuits.

One of the highlights of the week was our second and fifth years participation in the Maggie Gough competition alongside 15,795 other students from 182 different schools. Nationwide, six students achieved the maximum of 100 points and a total of 53 achieved 95 or higher. The overall mean was 55.44% and the standard deviation was 16.6%. Oatlands college performed extremely well in this competition, our 5th Year mean was 62.14% and our 2nd Year mean was 51.72%. We had 27 students from both fifth and second year get a score of above 80. What's even more impressive is that fifth year Séamus got a score of 100 points, making him one of six to do this across almost 16,000 entries. Additionally, fifth year Darragh achieved a score of 98%, and second years Toby and Thomas achieved 88% and 87%.

Lámh Presentation at the Four Ferns Nursing home

TY4 and Ms.Tobin went to The Four Ferns, a nursing home in Foxrock, to perform different stories and songs whilst using an Irish sign language known as Lámh. Originally made in the 1980s, Lámh was created in Ireland to provide a key word sign system in Ireland, for those who struggle with basic communication and needed various signs to support their communication. Lámh training is recognised by the Department of Education and is endorsed by the Irish Association of Speech & Language Therapists and Down Syndrome Ireland. Service providers give Lámh courses all around Ireland, including the HSE, St. Michael's House, Brothers of Charity and Enable Ireland. Lámh courses are delivered through AIMs Better Start and the Department of Education. TY4's performance included reading books and singing songs to the elderly people whilst using lámh. TY4 stayed at the nursing home for an hour performing and having conversations with the elderly people.



School Campus Updates

It has been a very busy summer in Wexford CBS as the school enhanced its facilities with improvements in the Woodwork Department, sporting facilities and in the extra-curricular area.

An application was made through the Capital Sport Grant for an overhaul of the existing gym, a brush mower for the Astro and retractable GAA goals for the Astro along with playing equipment such as sliotars, footballs, table tennis bats, bibs, water bottles and other items for games. The application was successful and Wexford CBS was awarded just under €40,000.



Work was ongoing over the summer as it was felt important to have the gym ready for use in September when the students return. A new rubber mat flooring was installed, along with four new racks, two full sets of dumbbells right the way up to 30kg, bikes, rowers, ski ergs, benches, boxes, trap bars, kettlebells, pull up bars and a magnetic white board for instruction. The new gym, painted purple and gold by some TY students last May, has been very well received by the students and staff alike.

Another welcome arrival to Wexford CBS has been two new dug-outs for the Astro. Playing a match in the all too common inclement weather has been difficult and uncomfortable for teachers and substitutes so the decision was made to install dug-outs which will be very welcome once winter arrives.



The introduction of new Wood Technology machinery marks an exciting advancement to our current workshops. These state-of-the-art tools and machines, including a laser cutter, 3D printer, precision lathes, automated saws, bandsaw, mortise machines and pillar drills provide students with the opportunity to sharpen their skills.

This technology not only enhances safety but also allows for greater creativity and precision in students' woodworking projects. With these machines, students can learn advanced techniques, improving their skills and preparing them for potential careers in design, construction, and manufacturing. Additionally, the new machinery encourages innovation, making woodworking both an engaging and modern learning. Exciting times at Colaiste Eamonn Ris!
