Hope Foundation trip to India Last year the Hope Foundation gave a presentation to our 4th and 5th year students about a charity trip to Kolkata in India. Nine students volunteered to take part and they visited India over the October midterm. We asked one of the volunteers to tell us about their experience.

The nine students all raised €2,500 each for the Hope foundation by bag packing, shaking buckets in Dundrum and outside a Taylor swift concert. We also did a sponsored walk, a bake sale, and non-uniform days in school. The money that each of us raised along with the other 53 volunteer students from around Ireland, funded schools, crèches, rehabilitation homes as well as a hospital set up by the Hope foundation.

The Hope Foundation's projects are in the city of Kolkata in West Bengal. A third of the city's population live in slum communities and many children do not have adequate access to healthcare, education, or clean water. Many children spend the day working, rummaging through rubbish, and begging on the side of the road.









While we were in Kolkata we witnessed this poverty first hand. We spent time with the kids in the schools and crèches where we played games, sang songs and danced. We learned of the inequalities that women and disabled people face even today. It's very common for young girls and kids with intellectual disabilities to be left on the side of the road and made to fend for themselves.

We visited cultural sites such as Hindu temples, the Victoria memorial palace and Mother Theresa's home.

The trip made us feel more grateful for all the things we take for granted. Even the less obvious ones such as our access to necessities like water and somewhere to go to the toilet but also an education, something of which many do not have access.

In conclusion I experienced a lot during the trip, and it taught me a lot about other cultures, how the world works outside the little bubble we all live in and how it's important for everyone to have equal opportunities in life no matter where you're born.

Having won an iPad for winning the regional final he went on to gain second place in the country today.






U-19 Basketballers Reach All-Ireland Final

Universal Design for Learning: A Path to Inclusive Education

On 14th November, the college welcomed Bláthnaid Breslin, a PhD candidate and UDL specialist, who presented on Universal Design for Learning (UDL) in postprimary classrooms. As a University Teacher in the School of Education and course director for BA Education with Languages, Bláthnaid brought extensive expertise to the topic.

Her presentation provided an in-depth exploration of UDL fundamentals, emphasising the importance of creating inclusive learning environments that accommodate diverse student needs. Leveraging her experience in educational leadership, research methodologies, and teacher professionalism, Bláthnaid offered practical strategies for implementing UDL principles.

These presentations demonstrated CBC's ongoing commitment to continuous professional development, innovative teaching practices, and creating responsive, inclusive learning environments. By engaging with leading educational experts, the school continues to support staff and student growth.

A Journey of Climate Awareness: PEACE Project in Copenhagen

In the heart of Denmark's vibrant capital, two Edmund Rice educators recently embarked on a transformative journey that promises to reshape how students understand climate action and European citizenship.

Edmond Hussey and Martin Boyle participated in the PEACE (Pan-European Awareness in Collaborative Education) Erasmus+ project, a groundbreaking initiative that brings together passionate educators from Denmark, Belgium, and Ireland.

Beyond Borders: A Collaborative Vision

The PEACE project, spanning 36 months from 2024 to 2026, represents more than just an educational exchange. It's a powerful collaboration between key institutions: DEO in Denmark, Europahuis Ryckevelde in Belgium, and University College Cork's Hub in Active European Citizenship. Their shared mission is both ambitious and vital: to elevate awareness about climate change and EU policies among young learners.

An Innovative Approach to Learning

The project's most exciting innovation is a semi-digital escape room experience designed to demystify the complexities of climate change and EU decisionmaking. During their visit, the team had the opportunity to test this cutting-edge teaching tool at Birkerød Gymnasium, working alongside Mr. Henrik Nilsson and his economics students.

This immersive learning approach does more than simply inform—it engages. By transforming complex policy discussions into interactive experiences, the PEACE project makes European issues accessible and compelling for young people.

The PEACE project aims to:

- · Increase awareness of European issues and the EU's role in climate action
- · Make educational resources on EU matters more accessible
- Empower students to engage with democratic processes
- Encourage consideration of diverse national perspectives on the climate crisis

Looking Forward

As climate change continues to be one of the most pressing global challenges, initiatives like PEACE offer hope. By empowering young people with knowledge, critical thinking skills, and a European perspective, the project is nurturing the next generation of informed, active citizens.

CBC: Stand Up Awareness Week

This year, CBC celebrated Stand Up Awareness Week from Nov. 4-8 through the theme of community. The annual initiative is aimed at fostering inclusivity, respect, and awareness within the school community, particularly in support of LGBTQ+ students. Communities are diverse spaces and include people from all different walks of life. Young people may be members of a sports community or within a youth group or musical community. Peace and Justice Belfast Immersion Trip

Our Edmund Rice Ambassadors and members of the Peace and Justice Group along with their teachers, Ms. Hally and Mr. Mc Laughlin visited Belfast last week and took part in a Homeless Advocacy Programme as part of Homeless Awareness Week. Here is an account of their trip from our Ambassadors.

Our Belfast Immersion Homeless Advocacy Programme took place in December. Our trip involved four of our Peace and Justice Ambassadors and our two teachers Ms. Hally and Mr. McLaughlin, learning about the problems of Homelessness in Belfast. On the first day, we attended an All Party Group on Youth Participation at the Parliament Building, Stormont. This was an insightful session and a great start to our immersion project for Homeless Awareness Week.

The following day we volunteered for breakfast service at The People's Kitchen. This entailed serving food and welcoming people experiencing poverty. This was a very enlightening experience as we got a chance to meet people who are sleeping rough on the street, living in temporary accommodation in today's world. Later, that day we reconvened at 5pm, linking with other Edmund Rice schools from Belfast, Manchester and Limerick. We then travelled to Edmund Rice College where we got the chance to present on our recent initiatives - The Sleep Out for Focus Ireland and The ERST Water for Life Campaign - our two leading campaigns of Advocacy for Homelessness. This was a great opportunity as we got to raise awareness around these worthy projects. Finally after a busy day we enjoyed a table quiz and reflection at Rosemount House Hostel.



There we had an opportunity to get insight into the life of recovering addicts and alcoholics who have experienced homelessness and share our initiatives with other Edmund Rice Schools. This trip was an extremely eye opening and humbling opportunity for us and our teachers involved.

We plan on bringing this learning experience back to our Peace and Justice Advocacy Group at school.



Water For Life Campaign

Our Water For Life non uniform day took place on November 27th. This was a very special day in which our Peace and Justice Group highlighted the ongoing plight of Children in the Middle East and the Water Crisis there. Later that evening the school doors were opened to all friends of the school, particularly former students and teachers. This Open Evening provided a welcome opportunity for people to walk down the familiar corridor of the main building and venture through the wonderful new buildings.

A photographic Exhibition was compiled by Margaret Rowe and Susan Sinnott. Photographs from the 1920s to 2024 were on display as well as many awards and roll books. These photographs transferred to the Gala Dinner in the Brandon House Hotel.

Mr. Barry Fitzpatrick, Deputy Principal, spoke to the assembled visitors and outlined some of the reasons why CBS Secondary New Ross is so special. Musical performances followed by the Head of School Jesse McGrath and his class mates Covenant, Abbie and Grace showcased some of the talent in the school. GAA National Coaching Conference in Croke Park

The GAA National Coaching Conference took place in Croke Park for the first time this weekend in four years. It is one of the biggest coaching conferences of its type in Europe with over 750 coaches attending. The theme of this year's Coaching Conference was 'Coaching for the Future: Where we All Belong.' The conference this year was based on player retention and aimed particularly at children and teenagers. It was a huge honour for us as a school to be chosen by the All-Ireland Post Primary Schools (National body for all GAA competitions) as a school of best practise in relation to maintaining really high levels of participation throughout the six years in school as well as performing and competing at a very high level. Mr Cahill and Mr Kelly outlined CBS Thurles's commitment to player participation, giving a presentation entitled "Creating a Culture for Participation and Performance in post primary schools". We were asked to tell our story in relation to how the school manage to have numerous teams competing at all age grades in schools hurling. Several schools have high numbers at first year but find a big drop off throughout the six years. The workload and commitment by the staff in the school was highlighted in relation to their dedication to make sure as many boys as possible are given the opportunity to train each year and represent the school in competitions. Numerous examples of the school entering two, three and four teams in competitions were presented and how they take place. Tipperary Games & Development, and Tipperary PPS were commended for the massive effort they make to run extra competitions and support the school. Several people could hardly believe that we entered four U17 teams in the county competition last year using 76 players, 74 of which were of the age. A question and answers session also took place over the 45 minutes of the presentation. Ciaran Kearney, secretary to the All-Ireland Post Primary Schools organisation facilitated the presentation. Antrim and Cushendall star Neil McManus, one of the key speakers on the day, was in awe at the sheer numbers involved in hurling in our school.

As a school the staff have worked extremely hard over the years to give every boy the chance to be involved on our hurling panels from 1st year to Harty Cup, so to be selected as a national example of good practise at a conference relating to player retention performance and participation, is something we are extremely proud of. As a school we are about participation and developing a player pathway for each boy to reach their potential. Some will go on to play inter county hurling while others will continue to play with their clubs or become coaches or administrators in the association.



The clubs and feeder schools that the boys are from were complimented during the presentation for the support and exemplary efforts they give to the boys to continue playing into adulthood. Our S&C, GAA program for players was complemented especially for boys that were not on county development squads, meaning that in conjunction with the clubs that these boys have the best possible chance of reaching their potential and continuing playing into adult competition. The Rice Cup hurling competition for CBS, former CBS and ERST schools was presented as an example of an opportunity to increase participation amongst students. The four competitions that take place within the structure of the competition is a great example of promoting participation for all students not just the first team.
