

# Cycle for Gaza: CBS High School students mark World Children's Day with compassion and action raising over €4000

On November 20th, World Children's Day, students from the CBS High School transformed awareness into action through a student-led cyclothon, Cycle for Gaza. The event aligned with the UN-recognised day dedicated to promoting children's rights, wellbeing and international solidarity. Students used the occasion to voice their concerns about global issues affecting young people, particularly the humanitarian crisis in Gaza.



The cyclothon was the latest in a series of student and staff initiatives focused on advocacy and empathy. As part of their 5th Year SPHE curriculum, students had been exploring the theme of community advocacy, culminating in this ambitious public demonstration of support.

Over recent years, humanitarian reports have highlighted the severe impact of conflict on children in Gaza. According to international sources, 'a Palestinian child had been killed every 52 minutes, with more than 18,512 students and 791 teachers reported dead.' Ninety percent of Gaza's population has been displaced and for the third consecutive year, children were unable to attend school. As UNRWA poignantly stated: "Education is more than learning—it is a dream and hope for a better future."





Earlier in May, over 300 CBS High School students participated in a demonstration calling for a ceasefire, organised under the Teachers for Palestine initiative, Let's Talk About Palestine. The event aimed to humanise and contextualise Palestinian history and culture while responding to the escalating crisis in Gaza and the West Bank following the October 7th attacks by Hamas. The situation remains under investigation by the International Court of Justice (ICJ), which is examining allegations of violations of the Genocide Convention by the Israeli Government.

In October, staff members hosted a bake sale, raising €1,140 for Concern's Cook for Gaza appeal. The fundraiser followed the declaration of famine in Gaza on August 22nd, with aid agencies warning of rising avoidable deaths due to the Israeli government breaching international humanitarian law by imposing restrictions on aid flows into the region.



On World Children's Day, students channelled their compassion into a symbolic act of solidarity. They collectively cycled 1,060 kilometres—10 times the approximate perimeter of Gaza—on stationary bikes placed at four public Clonmel locations: the Poppyfields, Fetch Coffee, the Post Office and the Showgrounds Shopping Centre. The students braced the bitter cold and were wholeheartedly supported by the community of Clonmel. Through words of encouragement and bolstered by motivating online comments to their idonate page and the school's social media pages, the students were able to succeed in their cycling target and in doing so raised an astounding €4053. Having surpassed their target of €3000 for Uisce for Gaza, an Irish-led initiative providing clean drinking water to Gazan communities through desalination projects, the remaining funds from the cyclothon will be directed to the relatives of Clonmel-based Palestinian families, who remain in Gaza suffering inhuman living conditions for them and their children.

The students' efforts were supported by generous donations from Camida Ltd, MH Engineering Ltd., Medite Ltd. and Phoenix Strength and Conditioning, which helped make the event possible.

Teachers described the project as a powerful example of youth-led advocacy. "It's our hope that events like this help to remind students that change often starts small. When they act with compassion, their efforts can have a real and direct impact on the lives of others." said Coordinator PJ McCoole.

On World Children's Day, Clonmel's young advocates didn't just cycle—they stood up for dignity, hope and the rights of children everywhere.

#### Zambia Immersion Project - June 2025.

The Wexford CBS Zambia Immersion Project 2025 has been a remarkable journey of dedication, learning and global citizenship. The project began in March 2024, when 16 students were selected to take part in this unique experience. From the very beginning, these students committed themselves to fundraising efforts to make the trip a reality, engaging with the school community and beyond to raise vital funds for ZAMDA Ireland. Over the months, their hard work and commitment paid off in an extraordinary way, with a total of €32,000 raised. These funds are crucial in supporting ZAMDA Ireland's ongoing work in Kabwe, Zambia, particularly at Sables Nua Primary School. The money raised has gone toward running the school, improving facilities and most significantly, supporting the construction of a shelter for street boys, some of Zambia's most vulnerable children.

During their three-week immersion in June 2025, the students and their accompanying teachers, Conor Byrne, Emma Goff, Steven McMahon & Christine Martin undertook a wide range of activities at Sables Nua.



They repainted classrooms and the administration block, levelled the play area, completed the preschool classroom with colourful educational designs and assisted with the building of the new shelter. Every student also took part in home-based visits, gaining a deeper understanding of life in Makululu compound and the challenges faced by the local community.

The group also visited Ranchod Hospice, donating essential items including a printer, a chest freezer and an office chair and spent time with Dominion FC, a local football club founded by former Sables Nua pupils, providing jerseys, boots, footballs, cones and goal nets. Their experience extended beyond Kabwe, with a visit to CBS Secondary School St. Raphael's in Livingstone, a spectacular tour of Victoria Falls, a river cruise on the Chobe River in Botswana and an overnight safari in Chobe National Park.



This project has been about much more than fundraising and volunteering. It has given students a unique opportunity to witness the realities of life in another part of the world, develop empathy, resilience and teamwork and make a real and lasting impact on the lives of children and families in Kabwe.

The Wexford CBS community is extremely proud of the students for their commitment, enthusiasm and dedication throughout this project. Their contribution to ZAMDA Ireland and the children of Kabwe will have a lasting effect and the experience itself will leave a lifelong impression on all involved.






#### **National SciFest Event**








### Smaoinigh ar Theangacha



Both lads represented St. Mary's CBS and their club with pride on the international stage. A fantastic experience and achievement for both players.






# Science Week in Oatlands College

Midlands Zoo presented an excellent bug and reptile workshop to our first years and third years went to Dublin Zoo for a very educational and enjoyable evolution workshop and tour of the Zoo. Finally, two of our past pupils gave an excellent STEM presentation to our senior students on their Engineering and Science courses in UCD.











# Oatlands College - Immersion Programme with the Teretta Foundation in Tanzania

This October, sixteen students from 4<sup>th</sup> and 5<sup>th</sup> Year travelled to the Kilimanjaro region of Tanzania on an immersion program with the Teretta Foundation. Students spent eight months prior fundraising at school events, outside the Aviva Stadium and in local shopping centres. Funds raised contributed towards the construction of a third classroom at the Teretta Foundation, a charity who provide education and a safe environment for at risk children in Tanzania.

While we were there, we saw first hand where our donations were going. We distributed resources to the local community that Teretta students grew up in, these resources included cooking oil, soap and new clothes for the children who were living there. Our group also visited a maternity ward in a hospital located in Moshi town, we were given a tour of the hospital and had the opportunity to gift baby clothes and blankets to all of the new mothers. We also funded the production of a custom wheelchair for a child living in a disability centre.



The most rewarding part of the trip was easily spending time at the Teretta school. There are currently 53 students enrolled, some of whom live there. Next month, with the addition of a third classroom, they are expanding to 90 students. The first time we arrived at the school, the kids flooded towards us with excitement. We spent the afternoon playing football and basketball, spending time on the swings and even teaching them how to play hurling. Every child was incredibly kind hearted and grateful for everything they had, it truly was a highlight of the trip.

To allow us a break from some of the more emotional moments, we spent some days exploring Tanzania. We visited an incredible wildlife park for endangered species, spent a morning with a tribe, swam in waterfalls and hot springs and learned about traditional cooking and art. These were all incredible experiences but nothing compared to our trek up Kilimanjaro, the tallest free standing mountain in the world. We spent three days on the mountain with an incredible team, climbing to around 4,000 metres above see level, for comparison Carrauntoohil, the tallest mountain in Ireland, is only 1,038m above sea level. Our stay on the mountain was an incredible adventure and a fantastic way to end our trip.

This experience gave us a new appreciation for how lucky we are to have such a comfortable life full of opportunity. Many of us hope to return to Tanzania in a few years to further support the Teretta Foundation. On behalf of all the students who took part in the trip we would like to say thank you. Thank you to our three incredible teachers Ms. Cosgrave, Mr. McConalogue and Ms. Rigney who helped us every step of the way. Thank you to Ms. Garrett and our board of management for supporting us on this project. Thank you to the Oatlands community, especially our parents, who gave us their overwhelming support in achieving this goal. Finally I would like to thank Lenore and Teddy, the founders of Teretta, these two wonderful women are making an enormous impact on the community of Kilimanjaro, we wish them the very best in their future projects.








# **Cycle Against Suicide**



# **EPAS Cross-Border Peacebuilding Trip to Derry**

#### 1-3 December 2025

Students and teachers from European Parliament Ambassador Schools (EPAS) across Ireland and Northern Ireland recently took part in a three-day cross-border programme in Derry. The event centred on peacebuilding, democratic participation, and the legacy of Nobel Peace Prize laureate John Hume. It was organised by the European Parliament Liaison Offices in the UK and Ireland, in partnership with the John & Pat Hume Foundation and the Northern Ireland Youth Forum.

## Day 1 - Welcomes, Workshops & First Connections

Participants arrived by train, coach, and public transport before checking in at the Holiday Inn Express and gathering at the historic Guildhall for registration and lunch. The programme opened with remarks from senior representatives of the European Parliament and the Hume Foundation, followed by an archival video of John Hume addressing the European Parliament on the EU's role in conflict resolution. Students then took part in a series of icebreakers and a lively "carousel" of activities, including:

- A guided tour of the Guildhall and Hume memorabilia
- Workshops on identity and shared values
- Speed-networking with peers
- · A festive EU-themed matching challenge

# Day 2 - Democracy, Dialogue & Youth Leadership

The second day began with the arrival of additional local students invited by the Hume Foundation. Stephen Clark, Director of European Parliament Liaison Offices, delivered an inspiring keynote on the importance of youth engagement in democracy.

A group photograph was followed by a major round-table discussion on EU-Northern Ireland relations with guest speakers:

- Kathleen Funchion MEP
- Mark Durkan, former Deputy First Minister
- John Cushnahan, former MEP

Students asked questions, shared views, and heard multiple perspectives on cooperation and peacebuilding.

In the afternoon, each school delivered a short presentation before receiving an EPAS recognition certificate. Evening workshops led by the Northern Ireland Youth Forum covered:

- Social media and disinformation
- Youth voices in peacebuilding
- A talk by former Mayor Cllr Lilian Seenoi-Barr

The day ended on a high note with a traditional Irish Cèilidh, complete with live folk music and dancing.



### Day 3 - Walking Tour & Farewell

The final morning featured a guided walking tour of Derry/Londonderry, including visits to the city's famous murals, the Derry Girls murals, and the Derry Girls Museum. Closing remarks were shared before participants collected lunch packs and began the journey home.

## A Powerful Cross-Border Experience

This three-day programme offered students a meaningful opportunity to learn about peacebuilding, the European Union, and the importance of constructive dialogue. Through meeting political leaders, youth advocates, and peers from across the island, students gained a deeper appreciation of cooperation and their own role in shaping a peaceful future.

The values championed by John Hume-respect, partnership, and hope were evident throughout, making this an inspiring and memorable experience for all involved.

Students are currently measuring the heights and circumferences of trees to estimate how much carbon is stored.

It works towards alleviating poverty by supporting the education of children and young people from some of the poorest communities in Calcutta and surrounding areas. There was great excitement in Midleton CBS recently as the India Immersion Team welcomed Br. Joel and Br. Placid to the school. The team first met both Brothers during their visit to Kolkata earlier this year, so it was a real pleasure to greet them on our home turf, and it was especially meaningful as this was the first time someone connected with St. George's School has visited our school.

Our connection with St. George's goes back a long way. The India Immersion Programme, which began in 2005, sends six students and two teachers to Kolkata every second year. During their stay, they spend time in the classrooms of St. George's School for Street Children, helping the children with their schoolwork and getting to know their stories. For many of our students, the experience is life-changing and a highlight of their time in CBS.

The programme isn't just about visiting, though. Each year, our students also raise funds for St. George's through a Christmas bag-packing fundraiser in the local SuperValu. The money goes directly towards supporting the school and the children who depend on it. When the team visited St. George's last February, Br. Joel was serving as Head Master. He has since taken on an exciting new challenge: establishing a new school in an area north of Kolkata, an initiative that reflects the Edmund Rice tradition of providing education where it is most needed. Br. Placid, meanwhile, is currently based at the international community in the Edmund Rice Heritage Centre in Waterford.

During their time at Midleton CBS, the Brothers met with students and staff, toured the school, and learned more about the longstanding partnership between our community and St. George's. As a gesture of appreciation, they were presented with school jerseys and locally produced gifts.



The visit was a really special moment, one that brought our long-standing link with Kolkata full circle. We're very grateful to Br. Joel and Br. Placid for making Midleton CBS part of their journey, and we hope it's the first of many such visits in the years ahead.

### **Dyslexia Awareness Week 2025**

For the second year running, we celebrated Dyslexia Awareness Week here at Midleton CBS Secondary School. Our approach was multifaceted. We organised and held a student-led Dyslexia workshop where our 5th years shared strategies, resources, digital platforms, apps and assistive technology supports including reading pens and speech-to-text and text-to-speech software with our 1st years. The student-led workshop was a huge success and it was great to see our older students lead the way for our first years in a relaxed and friendly environment.

We ran a lunchtime teach-meet where colleagues shared inclusive, universal design for learning strategies and resources to support pupils with dyslexia in the mainstream classroom and dyslexic colleagues also shared their own lived experiences of navigating the education system and the world of work.



The reaction and impact of our Dyslexia Awareness week at Midleton CBS was tremendous, equipping our dyslexic students with skills and strategies to mitigate the challenges they face accessing the curriculum, as well as instilling a greater sense of confidence in their abilities and potential.

Whilst as a staff, Dyslexia Awareness Week helps us to continue to develop our skills, understanding and to keep abreast of the most up-to-date strategies and resources to support our dyslexic students.







# **Excelling in Teaching and Learning**

# **Creating a Caring School Community**




Let us all make sure there is no room for any form of bullying in our school and our communities. Thanks to everyone for wearing their colours and standing up for others!



# Laudato Si Unity Project: Student Leaders Preparing for the March 2026 Conferences

Last year's Laudato Si Unity Project Student Council Conferences marked a significant milestone in student voice and collaboration across the Edmund Rice network. Over 245 students and 50 staff from 44 schools gathered for regional conferences that featured powerful student presentations, dynamic workshops and the memorable "Walk in My Shoes" session, where young people shared moving personal accounts of resilience, challenge and hope. These events created a strong foundation of partnership, leadership and solidarity that continues to energise the network. Building on this momentum, a planning meeting of student councils and liaison teachers took place online in early December to prepare for the next phase of the project, with the 2026 Student Council Conferences scheduled for March 2026. Students shared updates on their current justice and advocacy projects, reflected on this year's themes and identified ways to make the upcoming gatherings even more student-led and impactful.

The 2026 conferences will be hosted regionally by St Joseph's Fairview (Dublin), Sexton Street CBS (Limerick), North Monastery Coeducational Secondary School (Cork) and Woodbrook College (Bray). These gatherings will once again provide students with opportunities to connect, collaborate and strengthen their leadership within the Edmund Rice tradition.

This year's project continues to be guided by three network-wide advocacy themes: Caring for Our Common Home, Homelessness, and Inclusion and Belonging. During the December planning meeting, students also discussed current and emerging issues affecting their schools and wider communities:

- Mobile Phone Policies: Inspired by the Australian model, students explored the impact of school phone bans and reflected on the proposed national ban on social media for under-16s.
- Gender Equality: Students highlighted their awareness-raising work.
- Show Racism the Red Card North Monastery: As the proud host of the Cork regional conference, North Mon celebrated winning the Junior Section Award for their impactful anti-racism work and will present on this initiative. A 2nd-year student's original rap song, "I Choose," may even open the conference.

Students also shared updates on homelessness campaigns, environmental actions and initiatives promoting inclusion and belonging. These contributions helped to shape the priorities and workshop design for the March 2026 gatherings.

The Laudato Si Unity Project continues to be a vibrant expression of student leadership, solidarity and shared mission—and the March 2026 conferences promise to deepen formation, strengthen student voice and inspire collective action across the Edmund Rice network.
